The metaphoric use of husband and wife is never gender ambiguous

Biological Sex (natal sex): Intrauterine development

Same Sex Sexuality (Orientation)

Same sex attraction: Who are you erotically attracted to? Only SSA – 1.1% men, 0.5% women; Mainly SSA – 1.0% men, 0.9% women; Equally to both 0.4% men, 1.4% women

Same sex behaviour: Whom have you had sex with? Only SS – 0.9% men, 0.3% women; Mainly SS – 1.1% men, 0.8% women; Equally with both 0.3% men, 0.8% women

Sexual identity: How do you think of yourself? Homosexual – 1.9% men, 1.2% women; Bisexual – 1.3% men, 2.2% women.

Does NOT consider: arousal and fantasy

 Gonads male: Testis (undescended)

• External genitalia female (vagina)





2014 declaration of Sexual Rights:


3. The right to autonomy and bodily integrity:

Everyone has the right to control and decide freely on matters related to their sexuality and their body. This includes the choice of sexual behaviours, practices, partners and relationships with due regards to the rights of others.

The Confusion of Sex and Gender



Narcissistic individualistic hedonism

Fluidity: gender is considered a spectrum with no normative connection to one's biological sex.

Voluntarism: a person is whatever they want themselves to be, irrespective of biology, social norms, or any external authority.

4. Towards a **Christian Response**



Confusion happens

One of the effects of sin is misalignment from God's created pattern;

Including biological misalignment.

Therefore, gender concerns are not always a mental disorder; not always a "choice".
